Secret Holocaust Diaries: The Untold Story of Nonna Bannister

Nonna Bannister appeared to be a typical American housewife. She married Henry, the love of her life in 1951 and together they raised three children in Memphis, Tennessee. But Nonna was far from average. For half a century, she kept her story secret while living a normal life. She locked all of her photos, documents, diaries, and dark memories from World War II in a trunk in the attic.

In April 2009, Tyndale House Publishers, has published this eyewitness account of Nonna Lisowskaja Bannister, a remarkable Russian girl who saw and survived the unspeakable evils of the Holocaust.

Born into an aristocratic Russian family, Nonna Bannister fully expected to enjoy a cultured privileged life. Her parents had many comforts at a time when many Russians struggled to buy food. By her sixth birthday, Nonna spoke four languages. She had a good life. But then her life fell apart. The Nazis invaded Russia, and Nonna lost everything.


After being tricked into boarding a train bound for a German labor camp, Nonna wrote her diaries on small scraps of soiled paper, tied them together with a piece of thread and hid them in a small black-and-white ticking pillow she kept tied around

her waist. After immigrating to America, Nonna hid her memories in a trunk tucked away in the attic of her home, keeping it secret from everyone for many years.

Later in life, Nonna unlocked that trunk first for her husband, and now for the rest of the world. Nonna's story is one of suffering, torture, and death—but also of incredible acts of kindness that show the ultimate triumph of faith and love over despair

faith and love over despair and evil. *The Secret Holocaust Diaries* is in part a tragedy, yet ultimately it's an unforgettable true story about forgiveness, courage and faith in God.


