r. C. Ben Mitchell is Graves professor of moral philosophy at Union University in Jackson, Tennessee and editor of Ethics & Medicine: An International Journal of Bioethics. Prior to joining the Union faculty, he taught bioethics and contemporary culture for a decade at Trinity Graduate School in Deerfield, Illinois, a suburb of Chicago, where he was also director of the Center for Bioethics & Human Dignity from 2006-2008.

He received his doctorate in philosophy with a concentration in medical ethics (with honors) from the University of Tennessee in Knoxville. His program included a year-long clinical residency at the University of Tennessee Medical Center at Knoxville, Vanderbilt Medical Center in Nashville, and a summer-long residency at the East Tennessee Mental Health Institute.

Mitchell has done additional study in genetics for nonscientists at the Cold Spring Harbor Laboratories, Cold Spring Harbor, New York and has twice been visiting scholar at Green College, the medical college of Oxford University.

Institute of Technology, Chicago-Kent School of Law; a Fellow of the Center for Policy on Emerging Technologies, Washington, DC; and as a Senior Fellow of the Kairos Journal.

He was a member of the Templeton Oxford Summer Symposium on Religion and Science (2003-2005).

In addition to his academic work, Mitchell also consults on matters of public policy and has given testimonies before policymaking groups including the U.S. House of Representatives, the Institutes of Medicine, and the Illinois Senate. He has published in major news media, including the Washington Post and is interviewed regularly on radio and television, having appeared on National Public Radio, Fox News, MSNBC, and others.

His most recent volume is Biotechnology and the Human Good (Georgetown University Press, 2007), co-authored with Edmund Pellegrino, Jean Bethke Elshtain, John Kilner, and Scott Rae.

Dr. Mitchell is currently serving as co-editor of the Zondervan International Dictionary of Christian Bioethics to

We have lost one of our most wonderful Union supporters and inaugural auxiliary member in recent days. Emily Cox, a faithful prayer warrior, passed away and is now with


the Lord. For her life and influence we are grateful. Also, Founders' Circle member Dera Ashby passed away November 2009.

Second Place winner of the Geraldine B. Gee International Viola Competition and a two-time semi-finalist in the National Sphinx Competition, Dorthy White Okpebholo, maintains an active career as an educator, recitalist and orchestral musician. She has been a featured soloist at Urbana University, Wilberforce University, Cincinnati State Technical and Community College and at Union University.

Dorthy is the co-founder of a chamber music program in collaboration with the Cincinnati Arts Association that shares ethnic music with elementary and high school students through the use of classical instruments. She has been on faculty at Dyersburg State Community College,

Union University, and currently teaches online classes at Cincinnati State Technical and Community College. Dorthy also teaches private violin and viola lessons and is the director of the Camerata Strings in Jackson, TN.

As an orchestral musician, Dorthy has been a member of the Civic Orchestra of Chicago, Assistant Principal of the Aspen Sinfonia Orchestra (Aspen, CO) and has performed with the Columbus Symphony Orchestra (Columbus, OH). She has recently toured with the Sphinx Chamber Orchestra, has won viola positions with the Evansville Philharmonic and the Owensboro Symphony Orchestra and currently performs frequently with the Jackson Symphony Orchestra. Her orchestral performances include Carnegie Hall and have taken her all over the United States as well as China, Malaysia, Singapore and Hong Kong.

Dorthy began her viola studies at age nine. As a Cincinnati native she received her Bachelor and Master of Music degrees from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music.



Terry McRoberts is University Professor of Music, and teaches piano and related ourses. He performs regularly as a pianist in a variety of venues, is pianist for the Jackson Symphony, and is organist at First Inited Methodist Church. In 2009 he resented a recital at Bohai University in inzhou, China, and his article discussing the technical principles of Tobias Matthay appeared in the May-June 2009 issue of Clavier Companion. He currently serves as President of the Southern Chapter of the College

Music Society and Vice President of the American Matthay Association for Piano, and is a former president of Tennessee Music Teachers Association and was governor of Province 15 of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia.
